PMO's Approve's Rs 25,000 Crore Maritime Fund: A Game-Changer for India's Shipping Industry



New Delhi, Thursday, 14 Nov 2024 - In a landmark effort to redefine India's maritime landscape, the Indian government is poised to launch a Rs 25,000 crore Maritime Development Fund (MDF). Backed by the Prime Minister's Office, this initiative seeks to transform India's maritime sector by investing heavily in indigenous shipbuilding, expanding port infrastructure, and promoting blue-water capabilities. By supporting the Make-in-India mission, the MDF aims to propel India from a modest player to a major force in the global maritime arena, challenging established giants like China, South Korea, and Japan. This ambitious fund not only promises to reduce India's dependence on foreign vessels but also to generate significant employment, stimulate economic growth, and strengthen the nation's strategic positioning on the world stage. However, with these sweeping goals

come complex challenges that will test India's ability to balance rapid development with long-term sustainability and resilience.

The Maritime Development Fund will likely be structured as a corporate entity, with the government holding a minimum 26% stake while the majority will be offered to multilateral financial institutions and global funds. With Rs 25,000 crore spread over seven years, the MDF aims to fund long-term loans of up to 25 years, perfectly aligned with the average 30-year lifespan of maritime vessels. This fund is being positioned to be to maritime what the National Bank for Financing Infrastructure and Development (NaBFID) is to broader infrastructure. In practice, it will offer diverse financial assistance options-ranging from debt and equity to viability gap funding (VGF) and buyer credit. India's current fleet consists of 1,526 vessels with a gross tonnage (GT) of 14 million, but the aging nature of this fleet signals an urgent need for renewal, as 44% of these vessels are over 20 years old. By injecting fresh capital and support into the sector, the MDF could become a lifeline for modernizing India's aging fleet and reducing the country's dependence on foreign ships.

The Advantages: A Win for Indigenous Manufacturing and Employment

The MDF is designed to go beyond merely funding infrastructure-it is set to redefine India's maritime future in more ways than one.

1. Bolstering Domestic Shipbuilding: India currently holds less than 1% of the global shipbuilding market. The MDF aims to elevate this figure to 5% by nurturing local shipbuilders and incentivizing the construction of a diverse range of vessels, from cargo ships to cruise liners. Reducing India's reliance on foreign-built ships could save billions annually, creating a self-sustained ecosystem that will drive long-term growth.

2. Expanding Employment Opportunities: India's maritime sector employs a vast number of people, from seafarers to port workers. With the boost in indigenous shipbuilding and expansion of port capacity, new jobs will be created both directly and indirectly, positively impacting communities along India's coastline.

3. Encouraging Cruise and Coastal Tourism: By supporting coastal shipping and cruise tourism, the MDF aims to make Indian shores more attractive to tourists, with the potential to unlock substantial revenue and offer job creation in allied sectors like hospitality, retail, and services.

4. Tax Incentives and Global Partnerships: Tax breaks similar to those in Norway, South Korea, and Japan are expected to attract both domestic and foreign investment into India's maritime sector, potentially encouraging global players to establish ship-leasing and management operations in India.

5. Reducing Foreign Expenditure: India currently spends around \$75 billion each year on leasing foreign ships, holding only 2% of the world's total tonnage. By developing a homegrown fleet, this recurring expenditure can be redirected into building India's own capacity and infrastructure.

The Challenges: Overcoming Structural and Financial **Hurdles**

Despite the ambitious targets, the Maritime Development Fund faces a few notable challenges that must be addressed if India's maritime aspirations are to materialize.

1. Capital Intensive Requirements: Shipbuilding and port infrastructure projects are notoriously capitalintensive, with long gestation periods. Even with the MDF's support, these projects could require additional financing, especially if interest rates rise or global economic conditions change.

2. Skill Gaps in the Workforce: The maritime industry requires highly skilled labor and advanced engineering expertise, which India will need to develop or import in the initial stages. Developing these skills domestically will be crucial, yet it requires both time and investment.

3. Environmental Impact: The expansion of shipbuilding and port infrastructure carries an environmental cost. Protecting India's coastal ecosystems and managing pollution risks associated with increased maritime activity will be critical, especially in densely populated coastal regions.

4. Competition with Established Players: India will be entering an industry dominated by global powerhouses like China, South Korea, and Japan, which benefit from advanced technology and massive economies of scale. Competing with these nations will require India to innovate and potentially collaborate with international players.

5. Public-Private Partnership (PPP) Bottlenecks: Developing inland waterways and expanding port capacities will likely involve public-private partnerships. Managing these partnerships effectively, including safeguarding investor interests while maintaining public accountability, will be vital to avoid administrative delays and ensure the success of these projects.

What Lies Ahead

India's Maritime Development Fund holds immense promise and embodies a vision of a stronger, more selfreliant maritime sector. With the potential to reshape India's economy, create jobs, and fortify national security, the MDF could bring unprecedented change to India's coastline and beyond. However, the journey will require careful planning, efficient execution, and strong government support to truly make waves.

For the Indian people, the maritime sector represents not just industry but history, resilience, and a step toward a powerful future on the global stage. As India steps into a new era of maritime growth, the hope is that this initiative will be a game-changer, building not only ships but also new dreams for generations to come.

The Union Minister for Ports, Shipping, and Waterways, Shri Sarbananda Sonowal Launches 'Cruise Bharat Mission,' to Double Cruise Calls and **Passengers within Five years**



The Union Minister of Ports, Shipping & Waterways (MoPSW), Shri Sarbananda Sonowal, launched the 'Cruise Bharat Mission' from the Mumbai port. Aimed at the boosting the tremendous potential of cruise tourism in the country, the programme by the Ministry of Ports, Shipping & Waterways aims to propel country's cruise tourism industry by doubling cruise passenger traffic within five years; i.e. by 2029, said Shri Sarbananda Sonowal. The Union Minister of State, MoPSW, Shri Shantanu Thakur also joined Sonowal at this historic occasion.

Shri Sarbananda Sonowal launched the mission from onboard cruise ship 'Empress' here today. The initiative aims to excel India's vision to become a global hub for cruise tourism and promote the country as the leading global cruise destination. The Cruise India Mission will be implemented in three phases, beginning from 1 October 2024 up to 31 March 2029. The Phase 1 (01.10.2024-30.09.2025) will focus on conducting studies, master planning, and forming cruise alliances with neighbouring countries. It will also modernise existing cruise terminals, marinas, and destinations to enhance the potential of cruise circuits. The Phase 2 (01.10.2025-31.03.2027) will concentrate on developing new cruise terminals,

marinas, and destinations to activate high-potential cruise locations and circuits. Phase 3 (01.04.2027 -31.03.2029) will focus on integrating all cruise circuits across the Indian Subcontinent, marking the maturity of the cruise ecosystem while continuing the development of cruise terminals, marinas, and destinations.

Key performance targets across the phases include increasing sea cruise passengers from 0.5 million in Phase 1 to 1 million by Phase 3, with corresponding increases in sea cruise calls from 125 to 500. River cruise passengers will grow from 0.5 million in Phase 1 to 1.5 million by Phase 3. The number of international cruise terminals will expand from 2 in Phase 1 to 10 by Phase 3, while river cruise terminals will increase from 50 to 100. Similarly, marinas will grow from 1 to 5, and employment generated will rise from 0.1 million to 0.4 million by the final phase.

Speaking on the occasion, the Union Minister, Shri Sarbananda Sonowal said, "The 'Cruise Bharat Mission' is a watershed moment in the revamp of the cruise sector of India. Under the visionary leadership of Honourable Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi ji, the government is committed to harness the tremendous potential of Blue



Economy of India. Cruise, with its tremendous potential in our country, has remained unexplored for long. With this visionary mission, it is aimed at transforming our maritime landscape and harness the potential of India's vast coastline and waterways through cruise tourism. Based on critical pillars of infrastructure development, amp up cruise experience for tourists and sustainability of resources, the three phased mission will develop world class infrastructure and enable growth of cruise tourism and maritime trade."

The mission aims to continuously work towards the development of world-class infrastructure and destinations while leveraging technology to provide a seamless experience for embarkation, disembarkation, and destination visits. It will promote the cultural, historical, and natural circuits of the Indian Subcontinent, ensuring inclusive and equitable growth for all stakeholders, including ports, cruise lines, vessel operators, tour operators, service providers, and local communities. Additionally, the mission will enable the responsible involvement of all regulatory agencies such as Customs, Immigration, CISF, State Tourism Departments, State Maritime Agencies, District Administrations, and local police.

"Under the visionary leadership of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi ji, the government has been taking measures that witnessed a remarkable increase of 400% passenger footfall in cruise since 2014. The 'Cruise Bharat Mission' will further build on this as it aims to double volume of cruise calls from 254 in 2024 to 500 by 2030 and 1,100 by 2047. We are expecting rise in passengers from 4.6 lakh in 2024 to 5 million by 2047. The mission also aims to create 4 lakhs employment in the cruise sector during this period," added Sarbananda Sonowal. The Cruise India Mission targets three key cruise segments. First, the Ocean & Harbour Cruise segment encompasses ocean cruises, including deep-sea and coastal cruises, along with harbour-based yachting and sailing cruises. Second, the River & Inland Cruise segment focuses on river and inland cruises on canals, backwaters, creeks, and lakes. Lastly, the Island Cruise segment highlights inter-island cruises, lighthouse tours, live-aboard experiences, expedition cruises, and boutique cruises to lesser-known destinations.

Speaking on the occasion, the Union Minister of State, MoPSW, Shri Shantanu Thakur said, "Under the visionary leadership of Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi ji, this mission reflects the commitment of the Government to transform India into a world class hub for cruise tourism. This mission aims at creating sustainable and vibrant ecosystem which will be beneficial for cruise operators, tourists and communities. This visionary mission will power India's maritime sector which will open new vistas in tourism and harnessing the Blue Economy."

The mission has identified key initiatives across five strategic pillars. The Sustainable Infrastructure & Capital pillar addresses infrastructure gaps, focusing on developing world-class terminals, marinas, water aerodromes, and heliports, alongside digitalisation (e.g., facial recognition) and decarbonisation (e.g., shore power). It includes creating a National Cruise Infrastructure Masterplan 2047, setting up a cruise-focused SPV under Indian Ports Association (IPA), and establishing a cruise development fund. The Operations Including Technology Enabled pillar aims to streamline operations, ensuring smooth embarkation, disembarkation, and destination visits with a focus on digital solutions such as e-clearance systems and e-visa facilities.

The Cruise Promotion & Circuit Integration pillar focuses on international marketing and investment promotion, including linking cruise circuits, hosting events like the "Cruise India Summit," and forming alliances with neighbouring countries. The Regulatory, Fiscal & Financial Policy pillar is centred on creating tailored fiscal and financial policies, with a focus on tax scenarios, cruise regulations, and the launch of a National Cruise Tourism Policy. Lastly, the Capacity Building and Economic Research pillar emphasizes skill development, creating a Centre of Excellence for cruiserelated economic research, and formulating National Occupational Standards to promote youth employment in the cruise industry.

The Cruise Bharat Mission will not only elevate India's cruise tourism sector but also create lasting opportunities for generations to come.

The event saw participation from key leaders across the cruise industry namely Rahul Narvekar, Speaker of the Maharashtra Legislative Assembly; Maharashtra; T.K. Ramchandran, Secretary of Ports, Shipping and Waterways, Government of India; and Jurgen Bailom, CEO of Cordelia Cruises, including other dignitaries, government officials and stakeholders.

Indian Government's Merchant Shipping Bill, 2024: A New Era for the Shipping Industry



Mumbai, November 7, 2024 - The Indian government has long worked towards fostering international trade and boosting the growth of Indian industries, and its efforts have always had a positive ripple effect on the shipping sector. With global trade expanding and India striving for greater economic influence, the country's maritime industry has never been more pivotal. Recent moves by the government indicate a renewed focus on this sector, aiming to increase India's shipping tonnage and enhance its role in international commerce.

On November 7, 2024, the Union Cabinet approved the Merchant Shipping Bill, 2024, a landmark reform aimed at transforming India's maritime landscape. The bill seeks to modernize and expand the eligibility criteria for ship ownership and registration, paving the way for more ships to be registered under the Indian flag and helping India claim a larger share of the global shipping market.

One of the key highlights of the new bill is the flexibility it introduces in terms of ownership. Under the existing Merchant Shipping Act, 1958, only ships wholly owned by Indian citizens or companies could be registered under the Indian flag. The new bill, however, expands this definition to include vessels that are "substantially owned" by Indian entities, Non-Resident Indians (NRIs), Overseas Citizens of India (OCIs), and even Limited Liability Partnerships (LLPs). This change is expected to open up greater opportunities for foreign and domestic investments in India's shipping industry.

Another significant reform is the allowance for Bareboat Charter-Cum-Demise (BBCD) vessels to be registered under the Indian flag even before the final payment is made. BBCD is a popular financing model for ship acquisition, where the purchaser pays a fraction of the vessel's price upfront and settles the remaining amount over a period of three to five years. Under current regulations, a ship can only be registered under the Indian flag after the last installment is paid. The new bill will enable ships acquired through BBCD agreements to fly the Indian flag as soon as they are chartered, offering greater flexibility for ship owners and faster integration into the Indian maritime fleet.

These reforms are more than just regulatory changesthey represent a commitment to strengthening India's shipping industry, making it more competitive on the global stage. As more vessels fly the Indian flag, India will not only increase its shipping tonnage but also attract new investments into the sector, creating more job opportunities and improving the overall business environment for the industry.

At the heart of these changes lies a deep recognition of the contributions of Indian seafarers, whose hard work and dedication keep the global supply chain moving With more ships being registered under the Indian flag, there will be an increase in employment opportunities for Indian sailors and other maritime professionals. The reforms signal a new era of prosperity for seafarers, offering them better job security and improved working conditions, which in turn will contribute to the overall development of the maritime sector.

India Readies a Sea Change in Domestic and Global Shipping with Key Bills



India is poised to make significant waves in the global and domestic maritime sectors with the introduction of two transformative legislations: the Merchant Shipping Bill, 2024, and the Coastal Shipping Bill, 2024. These bills, slated for discussion during the Winter Session of Parliament, aim to position India as a maritime powerhouse by addressing critical gaps in the sector while promoting sustainability and efficiency.

With its expansive 7,500-kilometre coastline, India has immense potential to become a global leader in coastal and international shipping. However, the country's current modal share of coastal shipping stands at a mere 6%, significantly lagging behind maritime giants such as Japan, the European Union, and China, where coastal shipping plays a much larger role in the transportation ecosystem.

Recognizing this disparity, the government is set to introduce the Coastal Shipping Bill, 2024, designed to foster domestic trade and streamline commercial operations along India's coasts. By doing so, the bill aims to not only decongest land-based trade routes but also address rising pollution levels and reduce logistics costs-key pain points in India's trade infrastructure.

The Merchant Shipping Bill, 2024, on the other hand, takes a global perspective. It seeks to align India's maritime regulations with international standards and obligations under various conventions. This move is critical for bolstering the competitiveness of Indianflagged vessels and ensuring seamless integration with the global shipping ecosystem.

Despite its strategic advantages and vibrant trade history, India has lacked focused legislation to comprehensively promote coastal trade. "Our modal share of coastal shipping is meagre compared to other maritime nations. This has implications for increased congestion and pollution on land-based routes, as well as higher logistical costs," a senior government official remarked.

By addressing these challenges, the new bills promise to unlock the latent potential of India's maritime sector, creating a more sustainable and efficient logistics framework.

India's maritime sector can draw valuable lessons from countries like China, where the share of coastal shipping is seven times that of India. Similarly, Japan and the European Union have leveraged their coastal networks to foster economic growth, reduce environmental impact, and enhance trade connectivity.

Maritime Heroes: Exceptional Bravery at Sea Honored by the IMO



The International Maritime Organization (IMO celebrated extraordinary acts of courage at sea during the prestigious 2024 IMO Award for Exceptional Bravery at Sea. The ceremony, held in London following the Maritime Safety Committee's (MSC 109) opening session, recognized individuals and crews who displayed unparalleled valor in life-threatening situations.

IMO Secretary-General Arsenio Dominguez commended the honorees, stating, "It is truly an honor to recognize these heroic individuals, who took it upon themselves to act in the face of extreme danger at sea to save lives. Their bravery is an inspiration for all of us."

Captain Avhilash Rawat and the crew of the Marshall Islands-flagged oil tanker Marlin Luanda were awarded for their fearless actions during a harrowing attack by Iranian-backed Houthis in January 2024. While carrying over 84,000 tons of naphtha, the vessel was struck by an uncrewed aerial device, igniting a massive fire in its cargo tanks.

Faced with flames towering over five meters above deck and the destruction of critical lifeboats, Captain Rawat and his team launched a relentless firefighting effort. Braving potential subsequent attacks, the crew deployed foam monitors and seawater to combat the blaze. Their determination was bolstered by international naval forces, including French, U.S., and Indian vessels, which helped extinguish the fire after 24 grueling hours.

Speaking at the ceremony, Captain Rawat emphasized the teamwork and resilience that defined their survival. "I want to take this opportunity to thank my entire crew for their exceptional courage, professionalism, and unwavering dedication. Together, we overcame challenges that seemed insurmountable," he said.

Captain Jorge Fernando Galaviz Fuentes and the crew of the Mexican tugboat Pemex Maya were recognized for their life-saving actions during Hurricane Otis, a Category 5 storm that devastated Mexico's Pacific coast. Battling 185 mph winds and pitch-black conditions, the crew executed daring rescue maneuvers, saving six lives from four different shipwrecks.

Their precise and courageous efforts in treacherous waters showcased a level of professionalism and bravery that inspired awe.

In addition to the main awards, numerous maritime professionals were honored with Certificates and Letters of Commendation for their selfless service. These included:




- Captain Jerôme Noël Mougoula Saguiliba and Lieutenant Crépin Manfoumbi Mengara, who saved 150 passengers from the sunken ferry Esther Miracle off Gabon.
- Captain Brijesh Nambiar and the crew of INS Visakhapatnam of the Indian Navy, for their vital firefighting assistance aboard the Marlin Luanda.
- U.S. Coast Guard personnel for their courage in towing vessels during cyclones and rescuing individuals trapped by the Lahaina wildfires.

The IMO Awards not only honor individual bravery but also shine a spotlight on the resilience and camaraderie that define maritime professionals. As global challenges at sea persist, these stories of heroism remind us of the enduring spirit of those who safeguard lives and vessels amid peril.

ITF MARRAKECH POLICY ON MINIMUM CONDITIONS ON MERCHANT SHIPS

The 'Marrakech Policy', adopted at the International Transport Workers' Federation's (ITF) 46th Congress in Marrakech, Morocco, in October 2024, now forms the governing framework for the global union's campaigning work on Flags of Convenience (FOC).

The policy is the culmination of five years' work by union representatives from ITF maritime affiliates to examine, plan and develop a new strategy in line with the shifting reality faced by seafarers since 2010 – when the preceding Mexico City Policy was adopted at the ITF's 42nd Congress in Mexico City.

The Marrakech Policy, adopted by the Joint Seafarers' and Dockers' conference, sets out the minimum conditions the ITF and its affiliated unions will accept on FOC merchant ships. In doing so, it incorporates the new understanding of the critical importance of global supply chains that emerged out of the Covid-19 pandemic, as well as the central role for shipping and seafarers in combatting climate change through a just transition.

The Marrakech Policy will now form the baseline for the ITF's Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBA), which set the wages and working conditions for crews on FOC vessels, irrespective of nationality.

The Marrakesh Policy is a set of minimum standards for the working conditions and rights of international seafarers. It was adopted by the International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) at its 46th Congress in Marrakech, Morocco. The policy is the basis for the ITF's Collective Bargaining Agreements (CBAs) for crews on Flags of Convenience (FOC) vessels.

The Marrakesh Policy includes the following considerations:

Global supply chains: The policy recognizes the importance of global supply chains, which became more apparent during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Climate change: The policy acknowledges the role of shipping and seafarers in addressing climate change.

Seafarers' rights: The policy aims to improve the rights and working conditions of seafarers. The ITF's FOC campaign has been successful in persuading ship owners to enter into collective bargaining agreements.

The National Union of Seafarers of India (NUSI) has once again proven its dedication to the welfare of Indian seafarers by achieving groundbreaking improvements under the NUSI Norwegian agreements. The revised terms, effective from January 1, 2025, to December 31, 2026, ensure better wages, enhanced benefits, and progressive working conditions for seafarers serving on Norwegian-flagged ships.

The new agreement highlights NUSI relentless efforts to elevate seafarers' standards of living and working. Among the key features are:

1. Increased Wages and Benefits

- Wage Hike: A 3.75% rise in basic wages in 2025 and an additional 2% in 2026, benefiting all ranks.
- Related Benefits: This increase extends to associated entitlements, including leave and overtime, ensuring a comprehensive financial boost.
- 2. Enhanced Compensation Policies
- Death Compensation: Increased to USD 111,000, with additional child support of USD 20,400 per child (up to a maximum of three children).
- Disability Compensation: Raised to USD 108,300, providing greater financial security to injured seafarers.
- 3. Special Allowances
- Tanker Bonus: Increased to reflect the added risks of tanker operations.
- Provident Fund & Gratuity: Improved contributions ensure long-term savings and retirement benefits.



For the first time, the agreement incorporates the principles of the ILO Convention on Violence and Harassment, 2019 (No. 190), reinforcing equality and a harassment-free workplace. A major step forward is the introduction of maternity benefits, granting seafarers:

- 100 days of basic pay during maternity leave.
- The difference between basic and contractual pay for the agreed contract period.

These advancements make the maritime profession more inclusive and supportive for women.

NUSI has prioritized career advancement for Ratings holding Certificates of Competency (COC) as Officers. By covering the costs of training and skill enhancement for these Ratings, NUSI ensures their upward mobility and stronger representation in higher ranks.

Acknowledging the occupational risks faced by seafarers, ship-owners have pledged to consult the Norwegian P&I Club to streamline claims processes for those exposed to hazardous substances onboard.

These monumental achievements reflect the power of unity. NUSI dedication and the unwavering support of its members have led to these historic milestones, further strengthening the bond between the union and its seafarers.

As NUSI celebrates this victory, it is already setting its sights on new initiatives to uplift the maritime workforce. The union remains steadfast in its mission to provide unmatched support, better working conditions, and brighter opportunities for Indian seafarers.

Rescue and Repatriation Efforts for MV ISA STAR Crew Members



The safe return of the crew members of the MV ISA STAR to Mumbai on December 25, 2024, marks a poignant and historic moment for the maritime community. The crew, including 15 Indian nationals, had endured two lifethreatening incidents in the Red Sea, and their successful repatriation is a testament to the power of international cooperation and the tireless efforts of the National Union of Seafarers of India (NUSI), alongside other global organizations committed to the welfare of seafarers.

The crew members on board the MV ISA STAR included 2nd Officer Mrinmoy Bhardwaj, PumpmanSonu Kumar Rai, AB Sukhadev Singh, Oiler Anurag Tyagi, Oiler Malike Gopal, and 15 other dedicated maritime workers. These individuals, along with the rest of the crew, faced extreme challenges while working in one of the world's most perilous maritime regions.

On November 5, 2024, the MV ISA STAR was struck by a devastating explosion in its engine room while navigating the volatile waters near Yemen. The explosion left the crew stranded in perilous conditions, requiring immediate action to ensure their safety. The European Union's Aspides naval mission responded quickly, rescuing all 20 crew members. While the crew was safe, they faced additional challenges, including the loss of crucial identification and documentation, such as passports and Continuous Discharge Certificates (CDC), which complicated their repatriation.

Under the leadership of General Secretary Milind Kandalgaonkar, NUSI played a critical role in addressing the diplomatic and logistical challenges that arose from the incident. NUSI worked closely with the International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) and other key stakeholders to ensure that the crew's paperwork was swiftly processed, enabling their return home. The efforts of former Member of Parliament, Mr. Husain Dalwai, as well as the support from India's Ministry of External Affairs and the Indian Embassy in Djibouti, were vital in facilitating the repatriation process.

As if the crew's ordeal wasn't enough, the MV ISA STAR was again targeted on December 5, 2024, when it was struck by a missile in the Red Sea. This attack underscored the growing risks faced by seafarers in conflict-prone regions. Despite these threats, the crew remained resilient, and their safety continued to be the primary focus of international organizations, including NUSI and the ITF.

After weeks of uncertainty, the MV ISA STAR crew was finally reunited with their families in Mumbai on December 25, 2024. The emotional homecoming was a powerful reminder of the sacrifices made by seafarers and their families. As the crew disembarked and embraced their loved ones, the significance of their safe return resonated deeply within the maritime community, underscoring the importance of solidarity and collaboration in ensuring the welfare of seafarers worldwide.

The safe return of the crew also highlights the crucial role that unions like NUSI play in protecting the rights and safety of seafarers. NUSI unwavering commitment to advocating for Indian seafarers, both during times of crisis and in their daily work, is central to the union's mission. As General Secretary Milind Kandalgaonkar emphasized, the success of the repatriation was only possible through the collective effort of all parties involved, reinforcing the need for continued international cooperation to protect seafarers and safeguard their welfare.

This incident serves as a stark reminder of the increasing dangers faced by seafarers, particularly in conflict zones such as the Red Sea. The missile attack on the MV ISA STAR calls for enhanced security measures to protect commercial shipping routes and ensure the safety of maritime workers. NUSI remains dedicated to advocating for stronger protection protocols and greater international collaboration to address the growing risks in these regions.

Ultimately, the safe return of the MV ISA STAR crew is a victory for the maritime community as a whole. It serves as a powerful example of what can be achieved when unions, governments, and international organizations unite to safeguard the rights and well-being of seafarers. NUSI will continue to lead the charge in advocating for better security, safety, and support for seafarers, ensuring that their welfare is always prioritized. The challenges faced by the MV ISA STAR crew remind us of the inherent risks of working at sea, but also of the strength and solidarity that exists within the global maritime community.

To Be or Not to Be: The Quandary of Indian Flag Ships

The purpose of the visit was to enhance maritime security collaboration between the two governments and showcase strong maritime education capabilities of DGS approved MTIs.

We had a short presentation outlining the conceptualization of the Institute and the various courses/ facilities offered.

This was followed by a walk around of the facilities where the delegates got a firsthand view of the various practical hands-on training carried out.

After building a good appetite the delegates were treated to a sumptuous lunch, courtesy of the Catering trainees ably supported by their Instructors.

All in all, the visit had a successful outcome with the delegates gaining a firsthand appreciation of the rigour of a seafarers training.



The age-old question of "to be or not to be" has haunted both Indian policymakers and the maritime industry regarding the growth of Indian flag ships. It may sound strange, but the debate continues about whether it is in the nation's best interest to have its own robust shipping tonnage or if the country would be better off without it.

Sanjeev Sanyal, Member of the Prime Minister's Advisory Council, while speaking at the inaugural 'Sagarmanthan - The Great Oceans Dialogue,' emphasized the crucial role of the maritime



space for our economic survival. He called for a complete rethink in our approach to ships and shipping infrastructure, advocating for transformative investments in our maritime resources and capabilities.

K. Rajaraman, Chairman of IFSCA, who bears the major responsibility for transforming investment in Indian flag ships, expressed a different view. He stated that India should look beyond the flag of the ship, suggesting that utilizing foreign flag ships can also be a viable option. These contrary views reflect the varied and often conflicting interests of ship owners, cargo owners, ship charterers, and shipping finance and leasing companies. These conflicting voices and resultant policy indecision cause Indian shipping to take one step forward and two steps back.

The reasons for this dilemma are clear. Indian shipping is plagued by numerous challenges, each seemingly more insurmountable than the other. These include a lack of capital, high cost of capital, short loan tenures, the requirement to provide collateral security for loans instead of accepting ships as security, and a lack of understanding about restructuring loan requirements due to the industry's cyclical nature. Additionally, there is built-in inequity in taxation laws that often favor foreign flag vessels over Indian vessels, even in Indian waters. Problems such as timely repatriation of funds for ship acquisition, stringent regulatory requirements by maritime administration, the burden of training Indian seafarers, and higher port charges make Indian ships less cost-effective and less competitive than ships from countries where capital is easily available, or tax havens with relaxed regulatory standards.

In an era of quick fixes, 'giving up' seems a sensible solution when ships from other flags can be easily available at a cheaper cost, as opposed to tackling the multiple problems faced by Indian ships. From time to time, especially when the going is good, charterers and exporters demand easy access to foreign flag ships. However, when the demand for ships surpasses supply and chartering costs escalate, the same exporters are the first to advocate protectionism and promotion of Indian flag ships.

Policy makers should remember an important lesson from recent history. To control the Indian economy, the British destroyed Indian manufacturing and took full control over imports and exports via sea routes. Conversely, Japan, Korea, and China have secured and maintained control over manufacturing by promoting their domestic and international shipping and securing their supply lines.

A country with a population exceeding 1.45 billion, which depends largely on shipping for its energy needs and aspires to be a developed nation by 2047, cannot

afford to take the easy option of 'doing nothing.' This approach could lead to massive economic and financial costs, strategic vulnerability, power imbalance, and job losses.

During COVID, the Indian EXIM trade realized the importance of having its own container ships. In their absence, foreign shipping lines routinely skipped Indian ports, prioritizing costly electronic goods from other countries over perishable Indian agricultural exports and profitable routes over essential Indo-African routes for Indian exporters.

The government has been vocal about the importance of shipping. Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has discussed the growth of shipping in her budget speeches. Subsidy schemes for carrying government cargo and ongoing shipbuilding subsidies have been announced, but these measures are half-baked and do not sufficiently address the shipping industry's problems. These measures have not spurred ship ownership, a prerequisite for a self-reliant and resurgent India.

A comprehensive scheme addressing the non-availability of capital, high cost of capital, short loan tenures, inflexibility in restructuring loans, and discriminatory taxation for Indian ships needs to be rolled out. The proposed Maritime Development Fund in Maritime India Vision 2030 appears to be a step in the right direction.

Additionally, any industry competing internationally cannot afford a tax regime where Indian ship-owners must deduct thirty percent tax from their seafarers' salary while foreign ships in Indian waters do not. Nor can it afford to impose a five percent duty on vessel imports for Indian ship-owners, while foreign flag ships operate without such taxes.

Solving these discriminatory tax issues would provide significant cost advantages to Indian ship-owners, making them competitive internationally.

We do not need to look beyond the Indian flag. Instead, we need to closely examine the issues faced by Indian flag ships and resolve them to achieve the targets set for 2030 and 2047.

"Seafarer Salaries Surge, Yet Mental Health and Welfare Needs Persist: NUSI Leads the Charge for Better Support"



Life on board ships is not for the faint of heart. Seafarers face an array of challenges, from navigating treacherous seas to enduring extreme weather, particularly during the colder months. While the living conditions on ships have steadily improved over the years, seafarers still face cramped cabins that prioritize function over luxury. These spaces, though compact, are designed to meet basic needs and ensure safety, reflecting the industry's ongoing commitment to enhancing their quality of life. Yet, despite these improvements, the daily life of a seafarer remains physically demanding, mentally taxing, and emotionally isolating.

The sacrifices made by seafarers are immense. They spend long months away from their families, driven by the need to provide a better future for their loved ones. Their desire to secure a stable income and offer financial support keeps them going, even when the distance from home takes an emotional toll. This dedication to family and responsibility makes seafarers invaluable-not just to their families but to the global economy. Their resilience, often unseen and unacknowledged, powers the world's shipping industry, helping goods reach every corner of the globe.

According to a recent survey by Danica Crewing Specialists, salaries for skilled crew members have increased, primarily due to a shortage of qualified seafarers. This rise in wages is a step in the right direction, but it highlights a greater issue that is often overlookedseafarers' mental health. The survey revealed that 14% of seafarers reported feeling depressed during their last contract, an increase from 11% in the previous year. This shift underscores the urgency of addressing mental health challenges in the maritime industry. Although more seafarers are seeking mental health support, only 65% found the help they received effective, down from 75% the year before. Clearly, the need for accessible and reliable mental health resources is greater than ever.

For over 125 years, the National Union of Seafarers of India (NUSI) has been at the forefront of championing the rights of seafarers. Through tireless advocacy, NUSI has worked to improve the working conditions of Indian mariners, ensuring fair wages, safer work environments, and essential support services. NUSI commitment extends beyond pay and working conditions-it understands that seafarers' emotional and mental well-being are just as crucial.

In response to the growing mental health concerns, NUSI launched the "NUSI SAHARA" helpline in 2017, a free 24/7 psychological counseling service for seafarers and their families. This lifeline provides one-on-one, confidential counseling for mariners of any rank, helping them cope with the unique stresses of life at sea. NUSI SAHARA has become an invaluable resource, offering immediate support to those struggling with loneliness, anxiety, and the pressures of their demanding jobs. Every month, several sessions are conducted, ensuring continuous support. Each call serves as a reminder that behind the long hours and grueling work, there is a human being in need of understanding, support, and compassion.

NUSI work is a testament to the power of advocacy and support. By urging the maritime industry to prioritize the fair treatment, timely pay, and overall welfare of seafarers, NUSI is helping drive positive change. It is calling for an industry-wide shift, one that recognizes the profound impact of seafarers' well-being on the sustainability of global shipping. In a world where seafarers often go unnoticed, NUSI unwavering commitment ensures their voices are heard and their sacrifices are honored.

2. Onboard Training (9 Months):

Trainees will gain hands-on experience aboard ships, alternating between engine room and deck roles. This phase ensures comprehensive real-world exposure.

3. Advanced Training (4 Weeks at NOTI):

Upon completing onboard training, candidates will return to NOTI for a four-week advanced module, designed to refine and enhance their specialized skills.

Support from the Maritime Administration

The Director General of Shipping has extended full support to the program, committing to issue circulars to formalize the training framework to secure certification under provisions of STCW Chp VII/2.

Merit-Based Selection and Enhanced Curriculum

• Selection Process:

The incumbents will be selected from candidates undergoing 6 months pre sea GP Ratings Training at NUSI Maritime Academy Goa, upon successful completion.

• Curriculum Enhancements:

The curriculum incorporates maritime English and technical terminology, equipping trainees with the communication skills essential for global operations.

Collaboration Driving Industry Change

FOSMA and NUSI's joint efforts have ensured that the program is well-aligned with industry needs. By leveraging the training expertise of NUSI's verticals NMA in Goa and NOTI in Panvel-this initiative provides trainees with a structured, practical approach to skill development.

From Advocacy to Academia: My Pursuit of International Maritime Law at IMLI



As a young lawyer in Mumbai, I was fortunate enough to have worked for seafarers' cause from the beginning of my career which gave me a modest insight on the intricacies of international maritime law. The entire idea about maritime transport system, has always intrigued me and developed curiosity in me from the early days ofmy law practice. In my own professional and limited capacity, I have worked for seafarers' trade unions in India such as National Union of Seafarers of India, on a wide range of issues including maritime law. It is this keenness in the subject that has now led me to one of the most premiere and reputed institutes in the world to study LL.M. in International Maritime Law i.e., at International Maritime Organization (IMO) International Maritime Law Institute (IMLI) based in Malta. The ITF Seafarers' Trust was generous enough to support my studies and stay at IMO IMLI for which I will be always obliged.

IMLI was established in Malta in 1988 under an agreement entered between IMO and the Government of Malta. The mission of IMLI is to enhance capacity-building in all IMO Member States thereby contributing towards the fulfilment of the goals of IMO to ensure safe, secure, clean and sustainable shipping. As of 2024, there are a total of 176 Member States and 3 Associate Members of IMO. The IMO is catalyst to more than 50 international conventions and agreements for a wide spectrum issues and aspects on international maritime law. Therefore, being a part of IMLI is a unique and enriching experience for someone who wishes to be a part of this global machinery which is constantly striving towards development and upholding the rule of international maritime law.

At IMLI, we have professors and lecturers who are experts in different aspects of international maritime law. The professors and lecturers regularly represent IMLI in various international domain. Apart from the expertise of IMLI's in-house lecturers and professors who constantly strive to impart education to students coming from numerous countries with various backgrounds, there is also an impressive cadre of eminent visiting lecturers who are judges at ITLOS, ICJ, industry leaders, CEOs, authors, lawyers, heads and legal heads of various maritime bodies and representatives of UN organizations. On a regularly basis, IMO officials visit IMLI for providing us a firsthand insight and experience on the working of various committees of IMO. Therefore, we are given flavours from a wide spectrum within the maritime industry and different perspectives are being provided to us for our overall development and widening our understanding on the subject of international maritime law with both from the academic and practitioners' perspectives.


As far as IMLI's infrastructure is concerned, the students have been given an access to IMLI's vast library which has a sizeable collection of commentaries, books, law reporters, journals, articles, etc., Further, we also have been provided with access to prestigious online platforms. IMLI has provided us with a single-occupancy rooms for our accommodation wherein all the basic and essential facilities including but not limited to internet facilities have been provided. The lecture room at IMLI is equipped with hi-tech audio-visual system, both for the lecturers and students and the infrastructural environment resonates an interactive platform which is akin to the IMO conference hall.

The study course is intensive which has a mix bag of dissertations, assignments, presentations and written exams. Apart from the above, one of the distinguishing features at IMLI from rest of the LL.M. courses offered at various universities across the globe is 'the maritime legislation drafting project' wherein the students are required transpose an international convention (which is not yet incorporated and/or implemented by their respective countries) into a domestic legislation. The legislation project empowers and enables students to assist their respective governments in providing expertise in domesticating international obligations stemming from the conventions that they become State Party. This aims to effectively strengthen the rule of uniformity on international maritime law qua State practice. Further, the course also includes a field trip to London wherein the students get to visit major maritime organizations including the IMO itself at the actual meeting of the IMO's Legal Committee.

The total strength of our class is 65 students who come from 39 different countries. Very few courses on international law in the world would have students coming from so many countries which truly reflect IMLI's conscious effort of creating homogeneity in the international maritime domain whilst respecting the world's diversity. The various specialised courses offered at IMO IMLI are exclusive and unique which are designed not only for students' personal and professional growth but they also entail an effective step-in-aid towards harmonization of international maritime law across different jurisdictions.
